






All these practices are enabled by state actors, e.g. REITs and securitization need regulation to be made possible Likewise governments can (de-)regulate loan-to-value and loan-to-income ratios The financialization of housing is driven by the demand for financial products rather than the demand for housing These practices mostly (but not exclusively) focus on the existing housing stock not on new construction This implies that additional supply of finance in housing markets often does not result in additional supply of housing prices and rents
